## *Proud of Our Hometown*

Endicott College is proud to be a part of the rich cultural tradition of the North Shore. Like many other institutions of higher learning, we seek to contribute to the social, educational, and economic health of our community. Think of the cities and towns where colleges are located – Wellesley, Amherst, Newton, and Boston to name just a few. The college's name becomes synonymous with that of the city or town. And with good reason. Colleges attract not only thousands of students, but also thousands of visitors, enhancing the reputation of their communities. As Endicott has grown to become an institution that is nationally and internationally recognized, we have been pleased to shine the spotlight on our hometown.

## *A History of Service and Support*

In the past 20 years, Endicott College has placed a high priority on serving our community.

- Through community and volunteer service, our students and staff give generously of their time and talents to a wide array of agencies, organizations, and individuals in need.
- Our interns work in more than 290 companies and businesses on the North Shore.
- We create jobs and buy goods and services in the area, adding to the strength of the local economy.
- We have committed resources to aid the Beverly public schools, police, municipal government, and fire departments, with lasting effect for local residents.
- We hosted and sponsored the Youth at Risk Conference as well as the Conference of Mayors and Chiefs of Police of Massachusetts.
- We welcome the public to cultural and athletic events, and we open our campus for use by outside businesses, groups, and individuals for events both large and small.

## *What else does Endicott do for the local community?*

Endicott College is the largest donor of both cash and services to Beverly. Here are a few examples of our support:

- Endicott College returns, as a gift to the city, lost real estate taxes from homes, owned by the College, that are located outside the main campus (north of Hale Street).
- Endicott College recently made a pledge of \$450,000 over four years to the City of Beverly.
- In FY 2011 the College paid over \$539,945 in fees and permits.
- Each night we provide free food to the homeless shelter.
- We have raised over \$63,000 for cancer research and other health and community agencies in FY 2011.
- The College donates goods or cash equivalents, sponsors low or no cost events, and provides scholarships to local students. Endicott gifts totaling more than \$365,000 support events and agencies such as the Youth at Risk Conference, Beverly High School and youth athletic programs, Massachusetts Office for Victim's Assistance, Riverhouse Shelter, Beverly Rotary, Beverly Main Streets, Arts Fest Beverly, North Shore and Beverly Chambers of Commerce, and many others.

Taken as a whole, Endicott's support is impressive!

# DIRECT IMPACT ON THE LOCAL ECONOMY

Endicott College’s 647 faculty and staff members and its 4,423 students are both wage earners and consumers. Approximately 145 (22%) of the College’s faculty and staff and 1,900 students (43% of the student body (including residential students), reside within the Beverly city limits.

## ENDICOTT “GULL CARD”

Endicott students are able to use their “Gull Cards” for identification, dining, main gate access, residence hall access, and spending in the local community. Currently 23 local businesses accept Gull Card payments, encouraging students to become patrons at area businesses. Last year, student Gull Card spending alone totaled \$328,874.

## FINANCIAL AID

As of July 1, 2011, 342 of the 662 area residents at Endicott College (or 52%) are receiving financial aid. These students are receiving a total of \$4,411,065 in financial aid, of which \$1,755,492 (or 40%) are Endicott College funds.

Additionally, 69 of the 342 area students receiving financial aid (or 20%) are residents of the Beverly area. These students are receiving a total of \$849,018 in financial aid, of which more than \$315,515 (or 37%) are Endicott College funds.

## COMMUNITY SERVICE

## COMMUNITY SERVICE – KEY PROJECTS

Here are just a few of the activities in which members of the College community have shared their time and talents with residents of neighboring cities and towns.

### *Alternative Spring Break*

This year, 20 students and two staff members went to Phenix City, Alabama to team up with Habitat for Humanity of Russell County. They arrived to four concrete slabs and throughout the week teamed up with several other volunteer groups to frame, dry wall, roof, and put on vinyl siding to complete the building of four houses.

### *Boston Children's Theater*

Endicott College partners with Boston Children's Theater to share professors, workshops, and performance spaces. Through this partnership, programs for children ages 4–16 are offered each summer at Endicott College's Center for the Arts.

### *Federal Work Study, "America Reads"*

During 2010–11, students allocated over 1,272 hours of labor to nearby non-profit community partners and local school systems. This commitment increased the reading comprehension skills of children and young adults within our community.

### *Relay for Life*

Students, staff, and faculty came together to raise money for the American Cancer Society by hosting and coordinating the fund raising event, "Relay for Life." More than \$42,378 was collected as a result of this 12-hour walk.

### *Day of Caring*

Each year this event kicks off our Community Service programming. In September, students and staff venture off the Endicott campus and into the local community for a day of work, camaraderie, and caring. Originally begun as a response to the

tragedies of September 11th, the "Day of Caring" is designed to focus attention on the needs of others, particularly those in our local community.

### *Coast Sweep*

Members of the Environmental Club, joined by other students, participate in a state-wide effort to clean state beaches.

### *Neighborhood Events*

Safe Trick-or-Treating brings more than 350 Beverly children to campus for Halloween activities and give-aways. The College also hosts an Easter Egg Hunt in the spring and a Holiday Open House in December. Throughout the year, students and staff volunteer at the Greater Beverly YMCA, providing assistance to such programs as "Kid's Fun Night" and special needs events, including swim lessons and blood drives.

### *The Post Sports Center*

Endicott College provides athletic facilities to Beverly High School for night and day football, lacrosse, and soccer games. Among its many programs, the Post Center for Sports Science and Fitness Studies hosts Special Olympics all-day events and prep school basketball tournaments.

### *Center for the Arts*

Endicott's hallmark building supports a variety of arts studies and performance venues, with facilities that include a 250-seat recital hall with professional acoustics, a 100-seat black box theater, and several art galleries for student and visiting artists exhibits. The community is encouraged to attend various art exhibits, performances, and programs at the Center.

For two consecutive years, Endicott College was named to the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll, the highest federal recognition a college or university can receive for its commitment to volunteering, service learning, and civic engagement.

- The economic impact of Massachusetts' accredited schools, totaling more than \$80 billion, was nearly double the amount of money expended by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts in the reported year (about \$41.8 billion). (*Source: NEASC Economic Impact Report, Winter 2010*)
- There were 691 NEASC-accredited institutions in Massachusetts, including 585 elementary, middle, secondary, technical, and career schools and 106 higher education institutions. (*Source: NEASC Economic Impact Report, Winter 2010*)
- Enrollments in NEASC-accredited schools, colleges, and universities represent 7% of the New England population, which, as of 2010, was over 14.4 million. (*Source: IPEDS 2009 Fall Enrollment Survey, United States Census 2010*)
- Inter-industry transactions between schools and other businesses help stimulate and stabilize the economy. Everyday school operating expenditures become consistent streams of revenue for companies that provide services such as heating, cleaning, phone, and internet service to educational institutions.

- Massachusetts has the highest concentration of college and university students in New England. In fall 2009, 51% of the students enrolled at higher education institutions in New England were studying in Massachusetts, while the remaining 49% were enrolled at institutions across the five other New England states. (*Source: IPEDS 2009 Fall Enrollment Survey*)
- Higher education institutions in Massachusetts enrolled 32,879 foreign (nonresident alien) students in fall 2009 who contributed to the state economy by spending on local goods, entertainment, recreation, housing, utilities, and food. (*Source: IPEDS 2009 Fall Enrollment Survey*)

## *Economic Impact of Independent Colleges and Universities on Massachusetts*

- Massachusetts is the only state in the nation that educates more college students in the independent sector (over 293,000) than the public sector. Just imagine the cost to the taxpayers of the Commonwealth if the state subsidy of higher education were doubled. (Source: IPEDS 2009 Fall Enrollment Survey)
- Independent colleges and universities save Massachusetts more than \$3 billion in tax expenditures, and they have an economic impact of \$23 billion each year. (Source: Association of Independent Colleges and Universities in Massachusetts [AICUM] Case Statement, December 2010)
- Massachusetts independent colleges granted 75% of the Bachelor and Master's degrees earned by minority students in the 2009-10 academic year. Who would support this important segment of our society if the independent sector did not assume this opportunity or responsibility? (Source: 2010 IPEDS Completions Survey)
- Massachusetts independent colleges accounted for over 70% of all Bachelor degrees and over 83% of all graduate degrees in the 2009-10 academic year. How significant is the independent sector in creating and maintaining our much-needed workforce? (Source: 2010 IPEDS Completions Survey)
- 80% of Massachusetts independent colleges have endowments below \$350 million, with a median endowment of \$32.1 million. (Source: AICUM Case Statement, December 2010)
- Independent higher education in the Commonwealth employs 100,711 workers. By comparison, other prominent Massachusetts employers with the largest work forces include: Mass Mutual Life Insurance – 27,000; State Street Corp. – 13,642; Raytheon – 12,064; Fidelity Investments – 9,500; and EMC – 8,900. Higher education is Massachusetts' most successful business; it drives our economy and workforce development. (Source: AICUM Case Statement, December 2010)
